## **President's Message**

Dear fellow Photo Guild members,

This summer is almost over, and it brought lots of excitements for many of us, although not necessarily the good way. Since I am living in Nova Scotia, this is the first time the province is as green as it is possible. This summer brought heat and wildfires and then record amount of rain. I am hoping that you did not have much trouble with either the fire or the floodings the rains brought with them and that you managed to capture some amazing images in or away from Nova Scotia.

Our last season was a successful one with many great presentations and field trips. Thanks to all of you who helped making it possible. Without your help, the Guild would not be able to operate. Thanks to Joyce, Viki, Darryl, Dean, Pam, Antonio, Katherine, Rosemary, Bill, Terry B., Terry C., and Pat. And thanks to all of you who competed with your images through the competition season.

I am hoping that this coming season will be even better than the last one. Our program team was working hard during the summer to have yet another great season with many interesting webinars and field trips. Naturally, the usual competitions are scheduled as well. The program is posted on our website - <a href="https://www.photoguild.ns.ca/schedule/">https://www.photoguild.ns.ca/schedule/</a>. You can download the schedule to your calendar, or you can print it out.

We do have several field trips scheduled for 2023-24, but if you'd like to lead one to an area you know, please contact Dean or any of the Executive team – we'd like to hear from you.

Our meetings are still held online, as per our Executive team's decision earlier this year. We will review this decision before the end of 2023, and we will update you if anything changes.

We made a change how we apply the Sight & Sound Essay scores to the PoY cumulative points. Last year we averaged the judges' scores and then multiplied it by 1.4 when we added it to the PoY cumulative score. This year, we'll total the three judges' scores, and this total will be the final score for the Sight & Sound Essays. This means that a perfect essay will have 300 points. When posting the Sight & Sound Essay scores to the PoY totals, we'll use a multiplicator of 0.4667. This will result a maximum of 140.01 points for the essays, rounding it to one decimal would give us 140 points. I hope it makes sense.

As you most likely heard about it, some artificial intelligence (AI) image generator solutions are available that people can use to generate fictive images, using millions of photographs made by photographers over the last many years. This has stirred many heated discussions in the photography circles and several lawsuits as well. As these solutions are using images created by other photographers, these AI generated images are being disqualified in PSA and CAPA competitions. I believe in the future there will be a new competition category created for AI generated images. Our Executive team has discussed the above and we came up with the following rules we'll apply to all the Guild competitions.

Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in PGNS competitions:

- 1. All components of the submitted image are the makers original work and do not contain elements created or captured by someone else.
- 2. Use of narrow AI features such as Denoise, Sharpening, Masking, Subject Selection, and Resolution Enhancement of an image's size contained within a post-processing application is permitted provided they comply with the competition category's editing criteria.
- 3. A generated artificial intelligence (AI) image is not considered to be a photographic image because it was created by an AI system and contains no image captured by the entrant. Therefore, generated AI images will not be accepted into our competitions. The use of Adobe Firefly and similar programs are not allowed.
- 4. Content-Aware options in Photoshop or other plug-ins are allowed, but not the Photoshop Generative Fill.
- 5. Al sky replacement is permitted provided that the new sky was captured by the entrant and the competition category allows it.
- 6. All aspects of the post-processing for the submitted image were undertaken by the maker.
- 7. Computational photography as used in cell phones and mirrorless cameras, is allowed if the processing complies with the competition category's editing criteria.
- 8. For all potential winning images, the Competition Team may require an entrant to provide all the RAW images used in creating an image.

The themes for the 2023-24 season are the followings:

<u>Guild Assignment #1:</u> Perspective (must be photographed after May 1, 2023) **Guild Assignment #2:** Night (must be photographed after September 1, 2023)

The sun has finally arrived! I hope you are all able to get out and enjoy the good weather, especially since it has been few and far between this summer.

Competitions are still online and the upload deadline will still be 14 days before the club "competition" meeting. **September 17** will be the PGNS upload Fall CAPA Interclub competition where we will be selecting images to go away to represent our club in 3 broad categories: a) Nature (enter images in the following subthemes- Insects, Reptiles & Amphibians; Landscape; General Nature; Wildlife) b) Nature – Botany and c) traditional **Black & White** with the following subthemes (Person(s); Architecture; Dilapidated; Landscape).

It is important to note that CAPA's definitions and eligibility criteria can be different from PSA so please take note of the following differences.

### For all CAPA competition Categories:

The minimum size for Horizontal images is exactly 1400 pixels wide. The minimum size for Vertical images is exactly 1050 pixels high. Otherwise, the image will not load on CAPA's upload page.

CAPA requires that **all portions of the image must be captured by the maker**. This includes any textures or filters that you use for brushes.

It is equally important to pay attention to the different editing requirements as CAPA will disqualify images that do not meet the criteria. They are being very diligent in ensuring that there is a fair playing field for all and that everyone is obeying the rules. There were many instances of disqualified club and individual images last year with no chance to submit a replacement image.

Do not submit images in categories if you cannot/are unwilling to meet CAPA's eligibility requirements.

Ineligible images include:

- Submitting an image or substantially the same image which has previously been recognized as receiving a CAPA award.
- Entering an identical or simultaneously the same images or one that is substantially the same in both the 'individual' and 'club' components of the same CAPA competition.
- Al generated images from text prompts to create a submitted image

The use of digital frame, pin-line, borders and mats are **NOT** permitted in either category.

Images selected to go away in Nature will have to provide the original untouched JPEG or RAW file. These images will be subjected to CAPA's Image Verification Process. Many images were disqualified last year, when CAPA's Director of Competitions did not receive the requested file. After verification, CAPA deletes the files.

A DNG (except in the case of Pentax and selected cellphones) and a PSD file are not recognized as an original file.

In the **Nature (except Wildlife)** subcategories, '*Hand-of-man*' elements shall not be present, except where those human elements are integral part of the nature story (10% or less of total image area). In Wildlife, no "hand of man" is permitted.

The following are what CAPA considers examples of "Hand of Man":

- 1. Human body or portions thereof.
- 2. Sky cables, telephone/power lines, jet streams, aircraft, light pollution, artificial light, etc...
- 3. Land man-made structures or paths, buildings, concrete, man-made stone, telephone poles, fences, posts, sidewalk, domesticated or cultivated plants/food, cut grass, organized or systematic laying out of planted trees, etc...
- 4. Elements cut trees or branches or stems, tree stumps, posts, man-made food, objects or background, etc...
- 5. Sea boats, ships, piers, docks, posts in the water, etc...

You may submit one image in Nature- Botany and one image in the remaining 4 subcategories: Insects, Reptiles, & Amphibians; Landscape, Nature General; Wildlife.

For Nature, Restricted editing is as follows:

Restricted Editing – Techniques that enhance the presentation of the image without changing the nature story or the pictorial content, or without altering the content of the original scene are permitted – adjustments including tone and contrast, cropping, sharpening, noise reduction, flipping the image, minor cleaning up (e.g. removal of sensor dust or scratches or transparencies/scans, removal of chromatic aberration), HDR, focus stacking and in-camera multiple exposure taken at the same location at the same time (as a continuous sequence – seconds or minutes apart) are permitted provided that they comply with the CAPA's principles of authenticity so that they do not deceive the viewer or misrepresent the reality of nature. Dodging and burning are permitted on the submitted image. However, the obvious softening or blurring and/or vignetting of the background of an image in post processing is not permitted. Panoramic stitching is not permitted. All allowed adjustments must appear natural. No techniques that add, relocate, clone, replace, or remove pictorial elements except by cropping are permitted. Images can be converted to black & white. However, infrared images are not permitted.

Keep your dates open for June 25-27, 2024 for the next CAPA biannual Canadian Photography Conference which will be held in Kelowna, BC. More details will be forthcoming as they as soon as they are available.

### An Afternoon with Annie, Andy and Doc at the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia

Back by popular demand, we have arranged a viewing of a selection of prints from the Annie Leibovitz: Photographs from her Books collection held in trust at the AGNS. This year we will also be viewing images from Andy Warhol's Little Red Book #144 and Harold "Doc" Edgerton.

The images in the set have appeared in ten books: Annie Leibovitz: Photographs (1983); The White Oak Dance Project (1990); Annie Leibovitz: Photographs 1970-1990 (1991); Olympic Portraits (1996); Women (1999), American Music (2003); A Photographer's Life: 1990-2005 (2006); Annie Leibovitz at Work (2008); Pilgrimage (2011); and a limited-edition volume to be published at the end of the year. The set of photographs is Number One in an edition of three sets.

Andy Warhol was an American visual artist and is known for his pop art. Also known as "Papa Flash", Harold "Doc" Edgerton developed the strobe in the 1930s and was responsible for developing many of the high-speed photography techniques that are still in use today (<a href="https://edgerton-digital-collections.org/">https://edgerton-digital-collections.org/</a>).




## **Photography Trivia**


