CAPA News

I hope you have been able to get out and take advantage of the Spring's wonderful photographic opportunities.

Daniel Anderson is the featured presenter for May's CAPA's Monthly Speaker Series. On May 1, 8pm ADT, Daniel will be talking about Drone Photography, the challenges and how its use can complement your landscape photography.

For members that hold an individual membership with CAPA, the **May 4** is the deadline for CAPA's Annual Photo Challenge. The theme this year is Landscape, so enter four of your best images (two per theme), in the Rural Life and Urban/Suburban theme and you could win a very nice Tamron lens!

As a reminder, CAPA has created a pdf with its position on the use of AI-generated images in competitions. In brief:

Artificial Intelligence Renderings: Images that involve the use of AI generative techniques like inpainting (where AI generates pixels to fill in missing parts or <u>removes and replaces selected</u> element from the original photograph then using replace it with pixel element from the AI's generative dataset) or **out-painting** (where the AI extends the image beyond its original boundaries by generating new elements) are not permitted for submission into CAPA competitions, regardless of whether text prompts were used or not. The inclusion of Photoshop application features, such as Firefly's AI Generative Fill and AI Expand cannot be contained in your image submitted into a CAPA competition. Similar positions will be taken with other AI systems with these features. This has been posted on the Members Only section of the PGNS website. This helpful pdf also explains what is and is not allowed in creating your images for CAPA competitions. Sheldon Boles, CAPA's Director of Competitions has also written an article on how AI images are detected. <u>https://capacanada.ca/content-authentication-photographs-vs-aigenerative-images/</u>

Photography Trivia

The First Camera

Camera Obscura is the ancestor of the photographic camera. The Latin name means "dark chamber," and the earliest versions, dating to antiquity, consisted of darkened rooms with light admitted through a single tiny hole. The result was that an inverted image of the outside scene was cast on the opposite wall, which was usually whitened. For centuries the technique was used for viewing eclipses of the Sun without endangering the eyes and, by the 16th century, as an aid to drawing; the subject was posed outside of the room and the image reflected on a piece of drawing paper for the artist to trace. Portable versions were built, followed by smaller and even pocket models; the interior of the box was painted black and the image reflected by an angled mirror so that it could be viewed right side up.
