## **CAPA News**

Hello All,

I hope you all got out to enjoy the summer and shoot. Many of us attended the Canadian Camera Conference (CCC2013) hosted by Photo Fredericton. Michiko Nishijima and her team of Photo Fredericton volunteers ran the bilingual conference like a well-oiled machine. It was a wonderful occasion to immerse oneself in everything photographic and to learn from photographers all over North America. One of my highlights was the field trip to Shamper's Bluff. The next conference will be in Vancouver so make sure to pencil in July 31-August 2, 2015 on your calendars!

Please remember, in order to encourage new images, CAPA requires that the image to have been captured within 24 months of the CAPA competition closing date. For example, for the Fall 2013 competition, images should have been shot after Oct 29, 2011.

CAPA's definition for the OPEN category also applies to the Print and Theme categories. This year's CAPA Digital Interclub Theme is "Humorous". In the OPEN category composites are not allowed. The photographer can make enhancements in the camera (zooms, pans, multiple exposures, blurs, cropping) as well as modifications and enhancements using digital imaging software (HDR, focus-stacking, selective layering – using photographs of the same scene) to improve the overall presentation of the original captured image e.g., improved contrast/tonality, enhanced colour. Non-photographic components such as text,

lightning or computer-simulated imagery (which were not part of the original photograph) are not acceptable.

Please keep close track of your entries. An image that has been accepted to "go away" to a CAPA interclub competition may not be entered in another CAPA competition concurrently or in another competition year. For example, an image that has gone away to represent the club in Nature cannot be entered in the Print Division and vice versa.

More information on CAPA can be found on its website (capacanada.ca), including the benefits of individual membership. There are discounts for popular software like TOPAZ Labs, Proshow Gold and Producer and BLURB publishing as well as the opportunity to join digital imaging and print circuits for critiques. Another benefit is the Annual Digital Competition for Individual and Family members. Once again there are two challenging themes, "Artistic Portrait" or "Organic Architecture", which must be submitted by September 30, 2013. 

## In Memoriam



It is with great sadness that we announce that the longest serving member of our club, Fred Joyce, passed away August 24, 2013 at the Admiral Long term care facility. A memorial service was held on Tuesday, August 27, 2013.

Born in Chatham, Ontario on November 1, 1925, Fred Joyce served in the Medical Branch of the Royal Canadian Navy in Halifax for over twenty years. He also worked for the Provincial Government in the Clinical Chemistry Division of the Pathology Institute in Halifax before retiring in 1986. In the early 1950s, Fred joined the Photographic Guild of Nova Scotia (then the Colour

Photographic Guild of the Maritimes). Always an active volunteer, he served on numerous committees such as Slide Chair, PSA rep, many Halifax Internationals and a term as President in 1960-61. An accomplished nature and portrait photographer, Fred donated the Fred Joyce Portraiture Trophy which is awarded for the best portrait in the Annual Trophy competition.

Fred always took the time to make new members feel welcome and to encourage their photographic aspirations. Those that shot slide film will remember with great fondness the home evaluation group sessions that he and his wife (the late Betty Joyce) hosted at their home. One could always tell when one of Fred's images appeared on the screen for evaluation as he would quip "I don't know who shot this, but it's absolutely GORGEOUS!".

Thanks for sharing all your wonderful images with us Fred.



I had dreamed of going nowhere more than rural East Texas for over a year. I had reconnected with an old friend I'd not seen in 20 years, back when we both lived overseas. Now both returned to this continent, we'd spent hours on the phone describing



our lives, our families, and our new surroundings: mine here by the Atlantic, hers in Diana, Texas. In July, I finally had the opportunity to visit my friend, and see her (red)neck of the woods.



I knew I had arrived in the South even as I deplaned at George Bush Intercontinental

Airport in Houston: my favourite country song by Carrie Underwood was playing as I

awaited my connection to Tyler.

My experience of the South had thus far excluded ded Texas, having explored Tennessee and Mississippi 15 years



earlier, driving along Music Highway from Nashville to Memphis, and later to Gatlinburg, one of the strangest places I have ever



been: a cross between Niagara Falls and Las Vegas, without the Falls or casinos. After a warm reunion upon landing, the 60 minute drive out of Tyler helped reinforce my

knowledge that I was not in Kansas (er, Nova Scotia) anymore. The signs were everywhere. Even the sign at the local feed



shop advertised, "Pet & Livestock Feeds, Animal Health, Lawn & Garden, Fertilizer, Wild Bird Seed, Garden Seed, Plants, Bag & Bulk Feed, Hay, Ammo."



In Diana, at the ranch, I could only glimpse and guess at the true nature of my surroundings, concealed under cover of darkness. My friend had often told me how much Upshur County reminds her of the bucolic beauty of the Galilee, where we had met and lived some twenty years earlier.

Under a hot Texas sun my first morning, I could see, (and at 40°C, not counting the humidex, feel), the resemblance, right outside my window. Situated on hundreds of acres of farmland, it was a lush sea of green. My first acquaintances were Hank and Hebou, two of the dogs who make the ranch their home, running and dashing across the yard and beyond the fence where a couple of horses stood gracefully in the shade.



"Why did the chickens cross the road?"

Next, a very cocky rooster who, as I discovered during my stay, makes the rounds throughout the day followed by a small harem of hens.

On a rural road, in the distance, horses and hay bales, and a picturesque lane leading deeper into the property. Not a lot of traffic, except for pick-up trucks and farming

equipment, farm hands driving by sporadically.



Here, and on other ranches, we would see past meeting present, as aging pick-up trucks, trailers and other equipment sit side



by side with the latest in John Deere equipment and shiny new pick-up trucks.

During my stay I would search for evidence of cowboys and rednecks, and it

was not hard to come by. One of our first stops was Cavender's Boot City in Longview. More cowboy boots in every size and style than you can imagine, with the rich scent of leather permeating the store. I had promised my kids cowboy boots and cowboy hats; I left Cavender's



outfitted with 3 kids' sized cowboy hats and four pairs of boots: matching traditional black ones for my twins, pink rhinestone detailed boots for my daughter, and possibly the most gorgeous, hand detailed, pair of boots I have ever seen, for myself. A little bit of Cowboy Magic to bring home.

I was very aware of being in a country at war: every flight I took offered soldiers priority seating and free baggage checking; yellow ribbons were not as prominent as I remember during a US trip I took in 1991, during the first Gulf War, but there was a lot of support for the troops, a Wounded Warrior Alumni license plate holder, and the only Obama/Biden bumper sticker I spotted was on my friend's car.

Being in the Bible Belt, there were churches of every stripe, including the Texas Cowboy Worship Centre - alas, no cowboys in sight.

We took long drives as my friend showed me around Diana, Longview and the back roads, exploring the dichotomy of rich and poor: huge, sprawling ranches alongside small, mobile homes and trailers in varying states of disrepair. Many looked abandoned or indeed uninhabitable, yet to my surprise we heard voices, radios playing, TVs on inside.



I was surprised when I saw my first oil derrick - fenced off in the parking lot of one of the strip malls, quietly rising and falling on automatic pilot, a key, fitting piece of the constructed landscape, strange to me, but a common sight in this state.

I love the South, strange, foreign place that it is to me and my sensibilities. Politics in the Bible Belt are not my cup of Texas Tea, but make for an interesting backdrop, along with the kudzu. Memories of a Confederate pride and past are often in evidence, a reminder that Texas has a unique history amongst the States. There are more than a



few, who, like those who believe we will see the End Times, believe the South Will Rise Again.

As I wandered around these places with my camera, my friend stood back, warning me, "In Texas they'll shoot first and ask questions later!" Still, I was compelled by curiosity to poke around. I assumed a friendly



Canadian "Hello, how're you doing today?" with a smile would keep me out of trouble, but as it turned out, I never met a soul in my travels - although in some areas, out of

respect, I took my shots discreetly from the car window.

I discovered more than one proudly displayed Old Glory flag, one in a graveyard, another in a souvenir shop doorway, another on the door of private car lot, where old American vehicles make up a cross between a junkyard and a garage frozen in time. Although not a car aficionado, I do like vintage cars, simply for the sense of another time they have about them. I love their distinctive shapes: curves, fins,

chrome, some still shiny despite the gathering rust.

This in stark contrast to the love Americans have of their cars: it seemed everywhere I went the cars were very new, clean, and in good repair, no matter whether in upmarket or down-market neighbourhoods. This reminds me of a bumper sticker I saw in Mississippi: "I may be po', but I'm proud," - on the back of a Cadillac.

And of course there were SUVs and pickups larger than any I ever see in Nova Scotia. But in this man's yard, it was an antique vehicle graveyard, with at least a dozen or more old cars decaying in the heat and humidity, tires melting right into the ground, fusing with the landscape.



I once went on a date with a Texas native, many, many years ago. I'll never forget him saying, "I'm not American; I'm from Texas!" Southern and Texan pride are powerful things, a form of state pride I'm sure not encountered in all of the other fortynine, and definitely not something I've encountered in our own country's provinces.

National pride in the US of A takes on a whole other character, and in Texas it seems



to reach to another order of magnitude.

My stay this time was short; I could have happily lingered for weeks, just biding time under those beautiful Texas skies. I told my friend if one of the rental properties on the ranch came up for rent to let me know, as it would be a dream to spend a month or two down on the ranch, watching the kids play in the fields in the Texas sunshine, writing, reading, and exploring more of the back roads. It looks like I'll be heading back soon - this time to San Antonio and the Alamo. I am falling a little in love with the Lone Star State as my fascination with the South grows.
